#### FRONT STREET IMPROVEMENT SCHEME

Residents will be aware that over the last few months work has been undertaken on the Front Street to give it a much needed facelift.

The £20,000 initiative was jointly funded by County Councillors Jude Grant, Lucy Hovvels and Peter Brookes and Wheatley Hill Parish Council. Each County Councillor contributed £5,000 from their Neighbourhood Budget to the project and the Parish Council also contributed £5,000 as well as agreeing to make up any shortfall if needed.

The aim of the project was to spruce up the Front Street. The works included covering the boarded up empty houses and vacant shops with decorative vinyls. Shop rolling shutters were painted in a uniform colour and street furniture was given a new lease of life with a coat of paint. Once the works were complete the streets and pavements were given a "deep clean". Work started in September at the empty corner shop known locally as "Lucy Huttons". This shop has stood empty for many years and has now been fitted with a vinyl covering resembling a café.



The scheme was given the stamp of approval by the Shadow Housing Secretary, John Healey and Durham Police and Crime Commissioner Rog Hogg when they visited Wheatley Hill at the start of the initiative in September.



The Front Street was once a thriving area used regularly by residents and a focal point of the village. However, over the years it has become run down, houses have been boarded up and properties left vacant which has left the area looking unsightly.

The scheme is a direct response to the community's needs. Residents told us they have to live alongside these properties and they wanted to see something done to improve the Front Street. It is appreciated that this is only a sticking plaster and ideally we

would all like

vacant houses and empty commercial properties brought back into use. The scheme was a priority for the County and Parish Councillors representing the residents of Wheatley Hill and it was important that something was done.

The initiative has seen the business sector, landlords and residents all coming together to support the scheme and we would like to see more of this. It is hoped that the money spent will make a vast difference to residents.

Additionally we would like to see landlords and property owners taking responsibility for their property and we will help and

support them in a positive way to ensure this happens. We hope that when residents start to see a difference it will lift their feeling of wellbeing.

## Seasons Greetings from the Chair of Wheatley Hill Parish Council




Firstly, I can't go on to write anything about the Parish Council, without first paying my respects to the late Morris Nicholls.

He helped, guided and mentored me throughout my first years on the Council, and he always encouraged me to go higher. He was a fantastic Councillor for the Parish, District and County, an excellent colleague and a great friend. These are a few of the many reasons why I and the Parish Council wanted to honour him, by placing a memorial seat next to his headstone, to thank him for all he has done for Wheatley Hill.

Jake Miller (Chair)

I have served as a Parish Councillor since 2013, and as Chair since September 2017. Throughout that time we have supported a number of community groups across the village, from the Mother's Club, the Working Men's Club and the Community Centre. Each request for financial assistance or other type of support is important to all Members of the Parish Council, and we will do as much as we can, to support everyone in the village.



2018 has been a big year for the Council, for a number of reasons, but I'll just mention a few;

The Council worked alongside The Last Shift Committee, to ensure that 50 years since the closure of Wheatley Hill pit was properly commemorated.

Members took part in the unveiling ceremony and I made a speech about how important it is for my generation to remember the hard work and hard times that our families have lived through.

A big thank you to Ray Lonsdale for his creation.

Wheatley Hill Parish Council owns and manages 22 allotments and stable blocks that we rent to residents from the Parish.

This year we were faced with one of our allotments being used as a refuse site, which completely destroyed the allotment and damaged more.

Fly tipped rubbish including glass, building materials, baths, tyres, plastic containers, half a caravan and carpets illegally dumped on this allotment, needed to be removed and a plan of action was needed to ensure this would not happen again.

Almost £10,000 of the Council's budget was used to clear the fly tipped rubbish, re-fence the allotments and place boulders at the track entrance, to stop access to vehicles coming onto the site to illegally dump rubbish. That is £10,000 of expenditure that should have been used for funding community projects, the upkeep of our Cemetery and Parish investment into the village.



We don't think it's fair that money, which is meant for the village had to be spent on the removal of fly tipped rubbish. Despite weekly visits to the allotment site, monitoring and liaison with Durham Constabulary and Durham County Council it has been necessary to increase rents for allotments and stable blocks.

We understand that not all tenants allow their allotments/stable blocks to be used for this purpose. During a recent site visit we saw that tenants are maintaining their plots to a high degree; keeping horses on stable blocks, and growing their own vegetables on allotments. These are the reasons we have the site, and we encourage anyone who wishes to do such activities to contact the Council about applying.



It was agreed at this years' annual budget meeting that we would once again fund the Meals On Wheels project delivered by the Greenhills Centre. The Parish Council has done this since 2013.

It is important that we support the elderly and vulnerable in our community, and funding this project means that they receive a freshly cooked meal presented by a friendly face, which they may not have seen had it not been for this valuable service.

The Parish Council works closely with the community centre, and offers support to ensure that caring projects like the Winter Warmer Packs, and the exciting programme during the school six weeks holidays is able to go ahead for everyone's enjoyment.




On Sunday 11 November 2018, 180 crosses were displayed in the Cemetery, to remember the 180 men who never made it home after World War 1.



## Wheatlev Hill Cemetery



"50 Years Without Our Pit" Miner Sculpture

In 2014 The Mothers Club discussed the forthcoming 50th anniversary of the colliery's closure in May 2018 and proposed erecting a "statue" to commemorate the mine and miners. This led to local organisations forming a funding committee called The Last Shift to raise the money needed to have a sculpture fabricated by the well know artist Ray Lonsdale he of "Seaham Tommy" fame.

Over the last 4 years, village organisers, groups, clubs and individuals have raised funds, put on shows, organised fund raising events and projects and dug deep in order to raise the money needed.

The statue itself depicts a typical Wheatley Hill Miner, carrying a "Powder Box" over his shoulder, working the last shift at the colliery. He is positioned with a slight turn of his head toward the now reclaimed colliery surface infrastructure and pit waste heaps.

The Parish Council offered the statue a secure home in the Cemetery and agreed that once erected it would take on ownership of the statue for insurance purposes and future maintenance.

The official unveiling of the sculpture was held on 3 May 2018 at Wheatley Hill Cemetery, the date of the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the colliery's closure.

Residents will recognise John who has been with the Parish Council since 1989. Kenny is our newest member of staff and joined us in May this year.

John and Kenny are based in the Cemetery and are responsible for the smooth running and upkeep of the Cemetery. They can also be found out and about around the village, undertaking a wide range of duties which includes grounds maintenance, grass cutting, snow clearing and gritting, emptying of litter/dog bins and litter picking.

They are responsible for open spaces, allotments and activities operated by the Parish Council.

## REPORT DOG FOULING

If there is a problem with dog fouling in your area or you see someone failing to clean up their dog's mess, contact Durham County Council and give as much information as possible, such as date and time, location,

description of dog, dog owner and if possible their address.



The information will be passed to the Neighbourhood Wardens to take the necessary action against the offender. All reports are dealt with in confidence. If the pavement or verge is badly fouled Durham County Council can arrange for it to be cleaned and arrange for an officer to patrol the area in an effort to catch the offenders.
